

Join our EMS Corps Cohort and Receive a \$10,000 Student Grant - Apply Before 7/31! Applications are now open for the September Cohort of our Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Corps program. This program is a partnership between San Mateo County Health and Alameda County's EMS Corps Program.

This is a 5-month full-time no cost training program to become an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Participants will receive a \$10,000 student grant (\$2,000 per month) over the course of the program to cover living expenses. The program provides mentorship and job performance coaching to young adults (18-26 years with High School Diploma/GED). The goal is to support people with barriers to employment and education in San Mateo County. Graduates can apply to positions in the emergency medical services field, that can grow into thriving careers in health care.

EMTs have the potential to become:

- paramedics
- medical assistants
- radiologic technologist
- registered nurses
- firefighters
- police officers

#### **Local Nature Champions**

In June, the Natural Capital Symposium 2024 highlighted San Mateo County Health. Dr. Rachel Borovina presented as a pediatrician and the County's <u>Park Prescription (Rx)</u> <u>Program</u> co-founder. She shared about prescribing nature therapy to our County's most vulnerable residents. Dr. Borovina's message "access to nature equates to positive health outcomes but access is not equitable". She illustrated these concepts with three patient case studies.

We applaud our County Health team of nature champions, the Healthy Parks, Healthy People Coalition. They are dedicated to advocating for the clinic-to-nature connection, because equitable access and connection to nature should be a human right.

San Mateo County's African American Community Initiative (AACI) hosted its Juneteenth Celebration on June 14. The event took place at Eastside College Prep School in East Palo Alto. The day honors when the last enslaved people were freed in Texas two years after signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. East Palo Alto Mayor Antonio López read a proclamation recognizing June 19 as Freedom Day. The statement urged listeners to continue the struggle for true liberation and freedom. AACI Co-chair, Delicia Pennix, spoke on the history and importance of the occasion. Inspiring spoken wordpoetry, music, and rhythmic dance enraptured the audience. It was a day full of learning, reflection, and celebration!

## **COMMUNITY COLLABORATION HIGHLIGHTS**

CHIP Work Groups Guide Collective Action Countywide
The Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) work groups
continue to advance implementation in three communityidentified priority areas (see the <u>Chip Report</u>).

Mental Health, Access to Healthcare Services, and Social Determinants of Health work groups guide progress towards a shared vision of health equity. The Mental Health work group has finalized its vision and overarching goal. The vision is: All individuals and communities in San Mateo County feel empowered, supported, and engaged in mental wellbeing. The overarching goal is: Develop a county-wide and cohesive approach to improve mental well-being with a focus on decreasing disparities, especially among individuals and communities who are experiencing barriers caused by structural inequities including, but not limited to, racism, sexism, classism, ageism, and homophobia.

In addition, new co-leads have been identified for two of the three work groups. The leads are as follows:

- Access to Healthcare Services Co-leads: Ana Avendano (El Concilio), Chris Esguerra (Health Plan of San Mateo), and Corina Chung (County Health)
- Mental Health Co-leads: Luci Latu (Taulama for Tongans) and Doris Estremera (County Health)
- Social Determinants of Health Co-leads: Rafael Avendano (Redwood City Together) and Veena Raghavan (County Health)

# BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS VACANCIES

There are multiple vacant seats for the County of San Mateo:

- Commission of Aging: There is one vacancy on the Commission of Aging. This Commission develops and conducts programs in conformity with specific provisions of Older Americans Act of 1965 subject to approval of the Board of Supervisors.
